The money raised in the UK has now been transferred to SA, making use of a very reasonable exchange rate.



The IQAA Evaluation

In the middle of April the school underwent an evaluation by IQAA (Independent Quality Assurance Agency). In preparation for this the school had to produce a very detailed and comprehensive report covering all areas of school life, highlighting strengths, plans for progress and areas of weakness. The school was then assessed against this report over a 3 day period of intensive evaluation. The process was similar to the OFSTED inspections carried out in UK schools.

The staff team was led by Carolyn Revill, head of the Foundation Phase and teachers, Yolanda Van Den Broek (Grade 4), Anyway Muviyi (Grade 3) and Pontsho Koti (Grade R). These four people worked incredibly hard during Term 1, attending a training workshop in Johannesburg, carrying out surveys amongst pupils, parents, staff and Governors, gathering and collating evidence and writing a superb report covering every aspect of teaching at Dihlabeng School.

She then came and spent 3 days observing, monitoring and evaluating the learning and life of DCS. Her final report which followed was a realistic and extremely positive affirmation of the fantastic work that Dihlabeng Christian School is doing. She was full of praise for the children, the staff and the level and quality of learning at the school, as well as agreeing with and endorsing the areas that need to be improved.

The Dihlabeng Feeding Scheme now feeds 22 children, from Grade R to Grade 7. Each child has been allocated a lunch box, so they can collect their food in the mornings and return their box to the kitchen before they go home. Aletta, a member of the staff team, is employed to do the cooking for the feeding scheme.

Adult Literacy

English has been taught this term to two groups of adults, the ladies of People of Hope (one of the church projects) and the Sotho speaking members of the school staff. Each group receives an hour long lesson once a week and they are encouraged to use and practise their English on a daily basis.

These classes have been run by Alan Goodson assisted by Carol. It is a pleasure to see adults becoming more confident and skilled in their use of English.

We hope to run a class for members of the wider community in the spring (October).
