End of Term 2 Message from Andy Woodage - Principal of DCS.

Hello everyone,

I can hardly believe we have reached the end of the second term of 2021 and are half way through the year already. Where does the time go? If you had told me at the start of this COVID pandemic that we would still be held in its grip, I would have asked you to stop being so pessimistic. Yet, here we are! As I write, South Africa is experiencing a third wave and the President has just announced tighter lockdown restrictions, including the closure of schools. Thankfully, we have completed Term 2 and have just started our Winter Break so we are hoping this will have little impact on our school's calendar.

It has been a rollercoaster six months, beginning in January with the delayed reopening of schools (due to the second wave), which led to an adjusted start to the school year. However, it was not too long before infection numbers reduced and restrictions relaxed. We restarted sports clubs and even managed to reopen our jungle gym and find a soccer ball for the children to use during break times. We had some exciting moments too, such as the installation of solar panels, one above our Feeding Scheme kitchen and another above our pre-primary block, giving us hot water on-tap for the first time.

Unfortunately, then came an outbreak of COVID in our town. We experienced the first cases in our DCS community, with two teachers and three Grade 7 pupils testing positive. (I am thankful to say that all five of them are now recovered and well.) However, these cases were an indication that the third wave was arriving and we swiftly reinstated restrictions, including a return to playing only non-contact sports.

Of course, our brilliant staff have generated many wonderful learning opportunities in the last couple of terms. You can read more about some of those in this newsletter. I continue to be thrilled and delighted by the passion and creativity of the team that God has put together.

And, what of our future plans for 2021? Will we be able to take Grade 6 on a residential trip? Will we be able to play contact sports again? Will we be able to gather the whole school together for assemblies or parents' evenings? Who knows! South Africa is behind the curve with its vaccine rollout but the Department of Education is working hard to provide vaccines for all school workers and, as of publication of the newsletter, all of the DCS staff have now been vaccinated which is fantastic! We will ride this third wave with resilience and determination to succeed. We will continue to wear our masks and sanitise regularly, whilst giving our very best for the children in our care. We will trust in God for His wisdom and strength.

Thank you all, once again, for partnering with us and for your overwhelming generosity. Together, we are making a huge difference!

It was an action-packed three days, with archery, rifle shooting, zip lining across a lake, abseiling, swimming and team building activities.
