

Sporting Achievements

This year our young sportsmen did us proud in the inter-schools athletics, and cross country competitions. Antrie Mlangeni, Ralph Burls, both in Grade 4, and Cheslyn Burls, Grade 2 all had success in the cross country competitions. All three represented the school in the Free State regional competition. Ralph then went on to the SA National Cross Country Championships, representing the Free State schools at this level. For which he was given a lovely tracksuit in the Free State colours; a fantastic achievement. Rethabile Mokoena, Grade 7 was awarded medals for high jump and sprinting. Antrie Mlangeni, Grade 4 went all the way to the Free State Primary Athletics Championships, in Sasolburg, gaining a medal and a framed photograph award for the 80 metres sprint race.
